



Good News Reflection

The Holy Spirit empowers Christ's disciples to carry out His mission of mercy and love.

Through baptism, Christians are called to courageously teach and share the Good News of Christ, heal the sick and suffering, and even cast away demons in the footsteps of Jesus and the first twelve apostles. The mission territory was rough for Jesus' disciples as they walked side-by-side with Him in the lead. People kept asking who this Jesus was who preached against the grain of their everyday society. It was not any easier after Christ had ascended to heaven and left them to carry on His mission. Jesus never said it would be easy for any of His disciples, but He promised to send His divine Advocate to help, and the Holy Spirit is here to help all who call upon Him.



God created each of us for a particular time, place, and purpose to fulfill tasks only we can do to make a positive, loving impact on the world. It is no coincidence that we are planted where we are today. Everyone is unique, and the Holy Spirit gives each of us gifts to help us achieve the potential God has for us to help carry out the mission we have been given. Some are responsible for big mission territories, as leaders of a large group of people or even nations. For others, the mission territory may be as small as reaching out to one person at a time who needs God's mercy and love.


Religion and cultural worldviews have vastly changed over the years. Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen saw the beginning of today's crisis in 1974 when he said, "We are at the end of Christendom." He correctly warned of the demise of political, economic, educational, and social life inspired by Christian principles. We are living in a culture throughout much of the world that glorifies freedom by ignoring natural law and discarding the teachings of Christ. We are surrounded by the disintegration of the family unit, divorce, abortion,

immorality, self-centeredness, and greed. The world is begging for a savior – the very savior it seems to reject.

Remember, just as God called the apostles, He chose us for this time and this place! We did not call ourselves. God chose us and will empower us to share the wonders of His merciful love with the world around us. Just like the apostles commissioned by Christ, God gives us the grace to cure others in His name through our prayers, loving actions, kindness, encouragement, forgiveness, and second chances. Through our Christ-like love and compassion, we can even cast out demons that often take the form of fear, worry, anxiety, and guilt. The Holy Spirit is ready to help us in this new Apostolic Age of renewal.

Questions for Personal Reflection: How is God calling you to step out of your comfort zone to help someone, and how is the Holy Spirit equipping you for this?



Week 5: Mass as Supper

We are continuing our series on the Mass. This week, we are looking at the Mass as supper. At each Mass we celebrate the supper of the Lamb. Jesus provides himself as food and drink to nourish our souls. The bread and wine become his body and blood. This is an incredible mystery that deserves to be freshly examined and reflected upon from time to time.

Pray for your mind and heart to be opened to the mystery of the Eucharist throughout this week.



At Assumption, we preach in message series. Over several weeks, we will look at a topic and go deeper into it. We select a topic based on the weekend's scripture readings and dive deeper. These are the three questions we ask as we prepare each message series. What do we want the people to feel? What do we want the people to know? What do we want the people to do? This way, the message you hear in the church is not some head knowledge or something that flies over your head but touches the hearts and has practical applications for our daily lives. That's why I always mention "homework" in my messages. God speaks to us at every moment, especially in a community setting, when His people come together on Sundays and listen to the Word of God as we celebrate, pray, praise, and thank God. Then the discussion continues in the Small Groups and goes deeper. Our message series usually runs from September to July. Our mission continues to Love God, Serve Others, and Grow Disciples.



Disciple \'di-'sī-pəl\

Literally, one who learns. In ancient times, **disciples** followed and imitated a teacher, sharing in the master's way of life. In the New Testament, the term implies a broader definition than those described as "apostles" or "the Twelve."

WHY IT MATTERS

To be a **disciple** of Jesus today involves the same investment his original followers made. Imitating Jesus means embracing his way of healing, liberating, and forgiving. **Disciples** are called to be witness of Christ to the world and to live out the gospel daily. As Dorothy Day put it: "Everything a baptized person does every day should be directly or indirectly related to the corporal and spiritual works of mercy."

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "From the beginning, the first **disciples** burned with the desire to proclaim Christ: 'We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard.' And they invite people of every era to enter into the joy of their communion with Christ" (423).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What does the Bible say about discipleship?

A disciple is a student, from the Latin discipulus. In ancient times disciples lived with their teachers, listening to their words and imitating their actions. The intention was for a progression between the roles of student and instructor with disciples eventually becoming rabbis or prophets themselves. It was irregular for Jesus to make permanent disciples of his followers. "You have only one teacher and father in heaven," he told them. Another distinguishing feature of Jesus' school is that he chose his disciples, not the other way around.

The most intriguing part of Jesus' call to **discipleship** is that it took place in ordinary contexts, such as a fisherman's workday, not in a religious setting like a synagogue. **Discipleship** then deepened "along the way" with Jesus.

MEMORIAL OF SAINT BONAVENTURE, BISHOP AND DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH (JULY 15)

Discipleship explained

Like Saint Francis of Assisi, founder of his order, 13th-century Franciscan Saint Bonaventure saw in all creation vestiges of God and believed that through created things God speaks: "Every creature is a divine word because it proclaims God." In the search for knowledge, he encouraged humility: "If you desire to know, ask for grace, not instruction." And "in your deeds and words look upon Jesus as your model."

READINGS: Isaiah 1:10-17; Matthew 10:34-11:1 (389 https://bible_usccb.org/bible/readings/071524.cfm). "When Jesus finished giving these commands to his Twelve disciples, he went away from that place to teach and to preach in their towns."

FAITH IN ACTION

Remember that you are a unique reflection of Christ, Bonaventure advises: "A ray of light entering through a stained-glass window is colored in different ways according to the different colors of the various parts, so the divine rays shine forth in every creature in different ways and in different properties."
